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# THE RISE OF THE ROSES

It was the start of the 80's. "The Garage Flowers" were a typical non-compromise band sprouting from the same soil as other Manc bands such as The Fall, The Buzzcocks, Joy Division, New Order, Inspiral Carpets, Happy Mondays, James, The Chameleons and 808 State. The band then was Ian Brown-vocals, John Squire on guitar and vocals, Peter Garner-rythm guitar, Reni- drums and Andy Couzens on bass guitar.

"It was really shite then, music, so we thought we'd do it ourselves." said Ian Brown, "John started getting good on guitar, but he couldn't sing so I did. Realised we needed a good drummer, got one. Played a few gigs, made a few bad records, realised that we had to learn how to make songs rather than just noises. Started writing songs. And here we are."



"Back in '84 we played in Sweden." recalled Ian Brown, "The four people who came to see us seemed to enjoy it." In the summer of '84 they made their debut in a disused railway arch in Fairfield street, Manchester.

By '85 they'd done a Clandestine gig at the gallery, one at the Hacienda and a few warehouse parties. "We're either going to be massive or fizzle out totally. No-one excited us so we decided to do it ourselves." - Ian Brown. In '85 The So Young/Tell Me was released on thin line by Martin Hannet. In '86 the Roses got together with Gareth Evans whilst bass guitarist Couzens left the band. The Roses now a quartet released Sally Cinnamon and although this was not given much attention their gigs started to attract plenty of it.

In '87 Rythm guitarist Peter Garner also left leaving just Squire, Brown and Reni. At this time The Roses were not yet familiar faces and were only really known in name, still with no proper deal or media attention.

Mani joined the band in '87 as bass vocalist replacing Couzens who later joined The High. By '88 The Roses were finally getting somewhere. In May they played a benefit



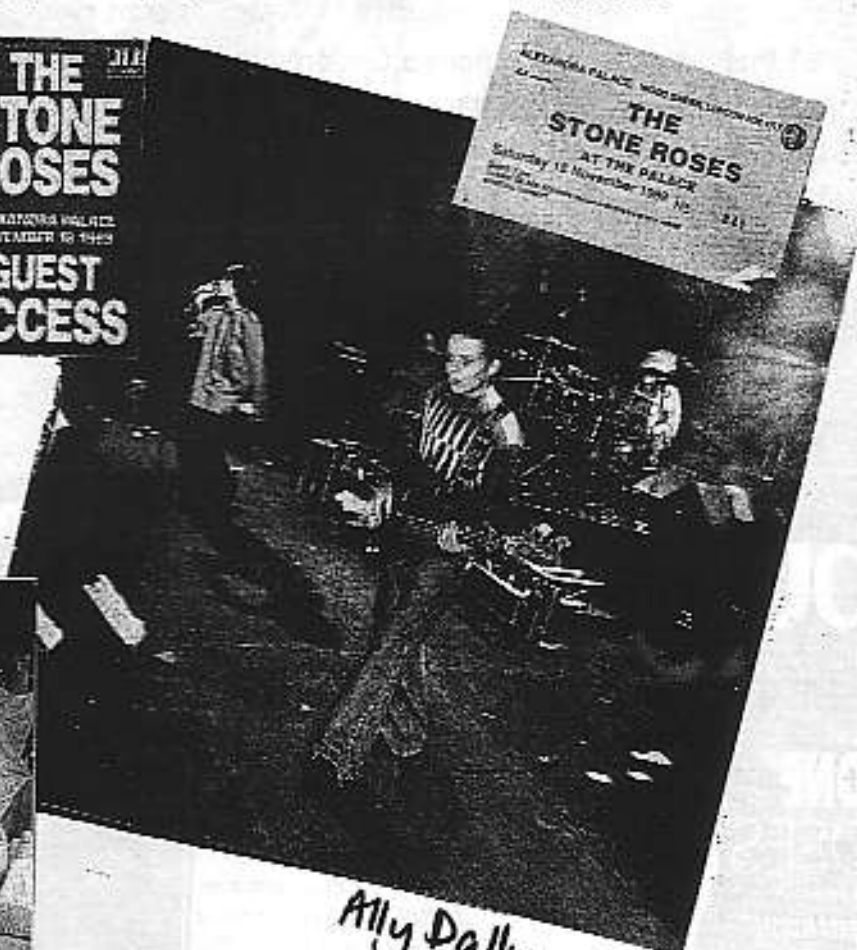
with James for the lesbian and gay equality North West campaign. They signed to Silverstone label and then came their first single 'Elephant Stone' produced by New Order's Peter Hook along with Full Fathom Five, same track backwards.

"If I thought we were going to continue selling 2000 records I'd give in now, but I seriously think we're gonna be huge. You can't keep a good band down." Ian Brown. After a string of unsuccessful gigs they played at international 2 and Central London Poly and became the band of the moment. Their gig at the Hacienda was a great success earning them a rave review in N.M.E. In '89 Top of the N.M.E. charts they had the music world at their feet. Single of the year with Fool's Gold, band and Lp of the year and best new artists. They refused to support New Order in the U.S and the Pixies. They also turned down the Stones in America.

"Fucking hell. We're not opening for them." said Brown, "They should open for us! It's obscene that they're even touring, Mic Jagger, I want to punch him out."

When the Roses got their London show at ICA, Steve Lamacq of NME saw them as just another group of Indie popsters, nothing special but Everret True was blown away by the show. "The Stone Roses have arrived" he said. Ian Brown also knew different, "We're the best band in the world because we've got the best songs and we haven't even begun to show our potential yet."

In July '89 She bangs the drums, Standing here was released and got single of the week in all three national music papers. A month later their 4000 ticket sellout to Empress Billroom was their biggest show yet. Tickets going for up to £50. They also played the Free Trade Hall. It wasn't one of their greatest gigs but still Fool's Gold /What the world is waiting for reached no.8 in the charts entering at no.14. The Roses appeared on top of the pops and played at London's Alexandra Palace.

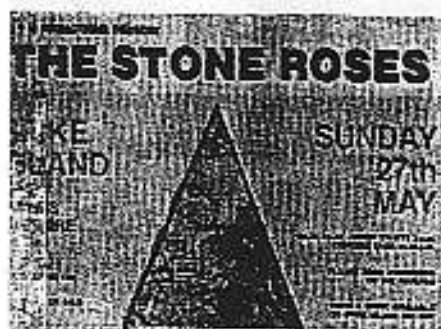

In January '89 they were arrested in Wales for damaging former record company FM Revolver's offices and two months later were in court again, Wolverhampton, for throwing paint over FM's offices and cars. They were released on bail. Ian Brown summed up their courtroom drama saying, "Some bloke from our old record company released an old single (Sally Cinnamon) we didn't want releasing to make a few more quid out of us and he ended up with paint all over his car...somehow."

Mani: "First we're all, come on your honour send us down do your worst! Then it's, you the Stone Roses have been sentenced to six months. Oh Fuck!"



They were released on bail. The day after their first International press conference May '88 (which ended in chaos) they played before 28000 people at Spike Island Widness Cheshire. Although threatened by organisational and sound problems it was still fantastic. Two days later May '89th Roses last single before their retreat to Wales One Love was delayed due to suggestion of a swastika in Squire's Jackson Pollock paint splash style artwork. Released a month later it was hyped to be no.1 in the charts but only got to no.4.

In June they appeared in a bigtop on Glasgow Green, selling 7000 tickets in record time. In September '90 their attempt to leave Silvertone resulted in an injunction preventing them from recording for any other label. '91 was the year the Second Coming was supposed to be out. "They're looking for studios" a Roses spokesman told MM "They will be going to record the next album as soon as possible and it will be out before the end of the year." In '92 they parted company with manager Gareth Evans and went to Wales to start recording The Second Coming and it wasn't until '93 that they had a visit from a Geffen executive. "We hardly heard a note out of them for two and a half years." said Ian "They just kept sending the cheques over."

In July 93 John Leckie quit working with the Roses and was replaced in August by Paul Schroeder. In December Roses publicist Philip Hall died of cancer not long after agreeing to be the manager of the band. Paul Schroeder's engineer Simon Dawson took over as producer in Feb.94 and it was not long after this that their old manager Gareth Evans sued them for wrongful dismissal.

In Sept. '94 the long awaited 'Second Coming' was finally completed. Nov.21st love spreads was released entering the charts at no2 as The Stone Roses biggest hit and Finally Dec.5th 'Second Coming on sale. Five years is a long time but you've got to admit it was worth every bit of the wait!!!!

## DID YOU KNOW?

Reni worked as a kissogram for a place called Livewires in Chorlton, Manchester!!!

Hours before Spike Island kicked off Ian Brown had the term V.I.P. tippexed off all the security passes, saying "Everyone's equal. There are no V.I.Ps in this world."

When the Roses first started out to get some cheap publicity they got their mates to write the band's name on walls throughout Manchester. "All it is is a bit of paint. You can rub it off. It's dead funny. It was done by some mates. We know who they are, but we're never gonna tell," said Ian Brown.

In 1990 The Roses were so keen to play down their Manchester roots that they refused to appear on the Madchester T.V. Rockumentary on the city's music scene. "Good job too" said Mani "It were shite!"

The sound in the outro of 'driving' (second coming) is a mobile phone dialling 0890 666!

Ian Brown took the line 'I am the ressurection and I am the light' from a Manchester city centre church hoarding.

Inspiral carpets released 'Garage full of flowers' on a debris flexi, apparently a tribute to the Roses.

Self taught artist John Squire started designing the band's paint splash style sleeves in his bedroom. "I've never tried to pass off my paintings as my own," he said "We wanted to put Jackson Pollock's on the covers, but they cost three quarters of a million each!!"

There is a band called 'Passion Fruit And Holy Bread' taken from one of the lines in 'She Bangs The Drums'

Reni's brother, Paul Wren appeared in Manchester Crown court on 3 charges of false representation. Over a 3 week period he'd taken £1400 from Reni's account claiming to be Reni! Reni's bank branch reportedly authorised payment when told that the man at the counter is 'a drummer who's a bit vague.'

John Squire has a passion for cycling and takes cycling holidays in France!

When The Roses signed the guest book on leaving the Bluestone studio when recording The second coming, Ian Brown signed as 'The laziest man in show business.' Reni wrote 'What time is it?' Mani wrote 'Nothing off for good behaviour, viva la proletariat' and 'PS. the sheep are tight' John Squire simply signed his name.

**They wouldn't play on Terry Wogan because Terry wouldn't speak to them after they played.**

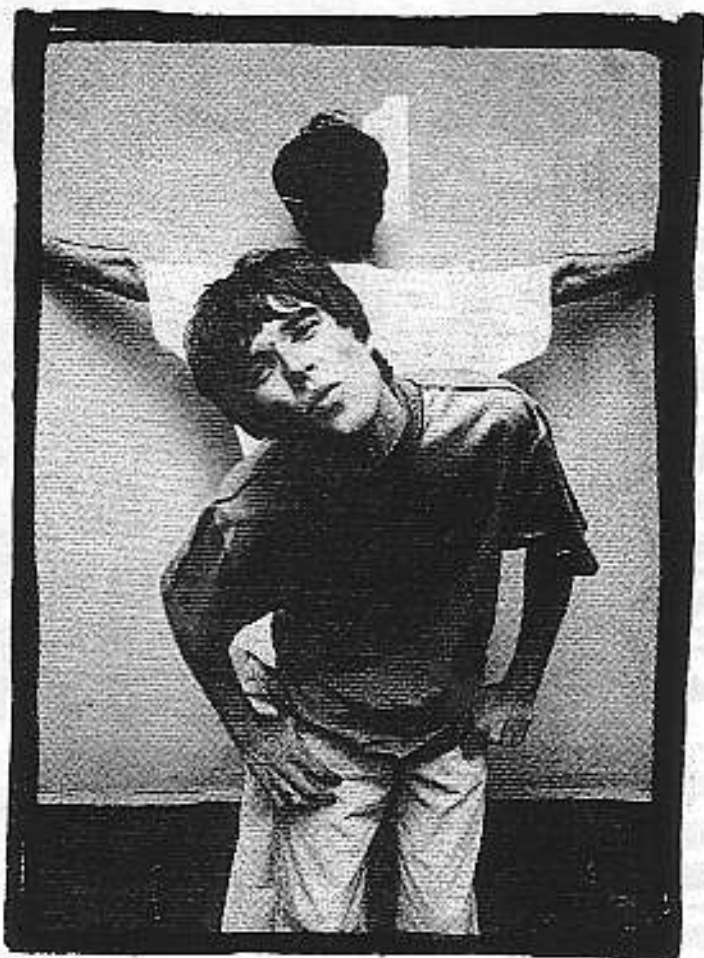
*Mani* - "We never went on Terry Wogan because we didn't want to part of that shit!"

*Squire* - "It's all a load of bullshit. It makes us look really bad."

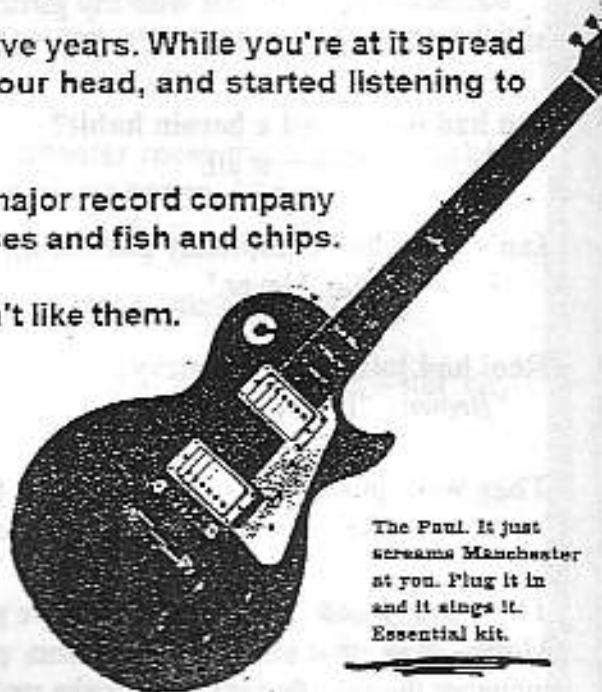

**THE STONE ROSES** have parted company with drummer Reni — though reasons for the split remain clouded in mystery, with some sources blaming his departure on his "unreliable behaviour" and others claiming it relates to a dispute over publishing royalties. One well-placed Manchester source said, "There's more than a grain of truth in both stories."

If the latter is the case, then Reni's departure could leave the Roses reeling from their third major legal action in recent times.

However, many sources are saying that the real reason behind the split was what's described as Reni's increasing "unreliability".

Reni failed to turn up for a number of press and publicity photo-sessions this year, and the Roses even shot the video to "Ten Storey Love Song" without him when he couldn't be located.

On the Roses' recent promo tour of America, the drummer conducted a number of his radio interviews by telephone from his hotel room rather than turning up in person at the radio station.

However, other sources in Manchester claim that Reni left the band last weekend (April 1 and 2) after issuing John Squire and Ian Brown with the ultimatum that either they give him a cut of songwriting royalties or he'd leave. The band, so the story goes, called Reni's bluff and he left.

Sources say that Reni was angry that his substantial contributions to "Second Coming" had gone largely uncredited. The same sources say that Ian Brown was largely absent for many of the sessions and that John

Squire's contributions to "Second Coming" were "markedly less" than his contributions to the Roses' debut album.

Not surprisingly, the Roses' PR company are refuting the claims that Reni left because of Squire and Brown's share of the royalties. But they were unable to give any other reason for his departure.

What is certain is that he's been replaced by 25-year-old Robbie Maddix, who has previously worked with Terence Trent D'Arby, Errol Brown, Ruby Turner and The Rebel MC.

Maddix began drumming in church gospel services as a child. He moved to Manchester at the age of 12.

His brother, ex-basser Ossie Maddix, said last week: "The Stone Roses is not the sort of work he's used to but, if you're a good drummer, everybody wants you."

Robbie spent the whole of last week rehearsing 18-hours a day with the Roses in order to get ready for European, Japanese and US dates in the next few months.

Maddix has been friendly with the band for a number of years. He was born in the south of the country, but now lives in Manchester.

The Roses cancelled their long-awaited, secret UK dates after details of them were leaked elsewhere. The band are now not playing the UK, but will instead kick off their sold-out European tour in Oslo on April 19. They then head off to Japan and America before returning for their Glastonbury Festival appearance in June. There is a possibility of UK dates after Glastonbury.
